ENTRANCE ANTIPHON: Give me justice, O God, and plead my cause against a nation that is faithless. From the deceitful and cunning rescue me, for you, O God, are my strength.

FIRST READING: Jeremiah 31:31-34

See, the days are coming – it is the Lord who speaks - when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel (and the House of Judah), but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive – it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest - it is the Lord who speaks - since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: Create a clean heart in me, O God.

SECOND READING: Hebrews 5:7-9

During his life on earth, Christ offered up prayer and entreaty, aloud and in silent tears, to the one who had the power to save him out of death, and he submitted so humbly that his prayer was heard. Although he was Son, he learnt to obey through suffering; but having been made perfect, he became for all who obey him the source of eternal salvation.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION: Glory to you, Word of God, Lord Jesus Christ! If you serve me, follow me, says the Lord; and where I am, my servant will also be. Glory to you, Word of God. Lord Jesus Christ!

THE GOSPEL: John 12:20-33

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. These approached Philip, who came from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put this request to him, 'Sir, we should like to see Jesus.' Philip went to tell Andrew, and Andrew and Philip together went to tell Jesus. Jesus replied to them:

'Now the hour has come for t

to be glorified. I tell you, most solemnly, man serves me, he must follow me, wherever I serves me, my Father will honour him. Now my soul is troubled. What shall I say: Father, save me from this hour? But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name!'

COMMENTARY:

St. Cyril of Alexandria (d. 444)

As the firstfruits of our renewed humanity. Christ escaped the curse of the law precisely by becoming accursed for our sake. He overcame the forces of corruption by himself becoming once more "free among the dead." He trampled death under foot and came to life again, and then he ascended to the Father as an offering, the firstfruits, as it were, of the human race.

"He ascended," as Scripture says, "not to a sanctuary made by human hands, a mere copy of the real one, but into heaven itself to appear in God's presence on our behalf."

Christ is the life-giving bread that came down from heaven, and by offering himself to God the Father as a fragrant sacrifice for our sake, he also delivers us from our sins and frees us from the faults that we commit through ignorance.

We can understand this best if we think of him as symbolised by the calf that used to be slain as a holocaust and by the goat that was sacrificed for our sins committed through ignorance. For our sake, to blot out the sins of the world, he laid down his life.

Recognised then in bread as life and the giver of life, in the calf as a holocaust offered by himself to God the Father as an appeasing fragrance, in the goat as one who became sin for our sake and was slain for our As for us: let's ponder on the Lord's words: transgressions, Christ is also symbolized in another way by a sheaf of grain, as a brief explanation will show.

The human race may be compared to spikes of unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and wheat in a field, rising, as it were, from the earth, dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it awaiting their full growth and development, and dies, it yields a rich harvest. Anyone who loves then in time being cut down by the reaper, which his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in is death. The comparison is apt, since Christ this world will keep it for the eternal life. If a himself spoke of our race in this way when he said to his holy disciples: "Do you not say, 'Four am, my servant will be there too. If anyone months and it will be harvest time?' Look at the fields I tell you, they are already white and ready for harvesting. The reaper is already receiving his wages and bringing in a crop for eternal life."

Now Christ became like one of us; he sprang from the holy Virgin like a spike of wheat from the ground. Indeed, he spoke of himself as a grain it, and I will glorify it again.' > For we do not think of a spike of wheat in isolation, any more than we do of ourselves. We think of it rather as part of a sheaf, which is a single bundle made up of many spikes. The spikes have to be gathered into a bundle before they can be used, and this is the key to the mystery they represent, the mystery of Christ who, though one, appears in the image of a sheaf to be made up of many, as in fact he is.

Spiritually, he contains in himself all believers. "As we have been raised up with him," writes Saint Paul, "so we have also been enthroned with him in heaven." He is a human being like ourselves, and this has made us one body with him, the body being the bond that unites us.

We can say, therefore, that in him we are all one, and indeed he himself says to God, his heavenly Father: "It is my desire that as I and you are one, so they also may be one in us." Commentary on Numbers 2.

REFLECTION ON THE READINGS by Fr John:

All three texts for today's Liturgy of the Word speak of a dying to the old ways in order to begin something new:

* From an Old covenant to one now written in our hearts

* Through His Obedience, Christ's death leads to new life and eternal salvation for us

Unless the grain of wheat dies, it cannot become something new...

As Christians we are continually asked by the Lord through the Scriptures and His Church to die to the old ways and begin a new way of living. Indeed, our Lenten Season is all about dying to sin and thus being prepared to experience a rising to a sinless existence in Christ.

And the best way that we can imitate the Lord in his Death and Rising again is to move from selfcentred existence to a life lived for others. The Lord was someone whose whole existence was 'other-directed' - to the Father of us all and to His neighbours. Christ is the embodiment of the New Covenant written in our hearts; he is the one willing to be obedient to the Father's will and serve his friends - even unto Death!

"If someone serves me, they must follow me; wherever I am, my servant will be there too"!

Notes from Fr John:

1. Next Sunday is PALM SUNDAY, and the Commencement of HOLY WEEK. Please note the Mass and Celebration times in the Bulletin. There may be a few changes from past years.

We are having difficulty during these COVID times sourcing Palms; and, in any case, in order to be COVID safe, we cannot allow people to put their hands in a basket and take a palm. So, we are asking that you bring your own 'palm' for next Sunday - whether this is truly a palm branch (hard to find up here), or an inculturation of the Tradition by bringing a branch of a native plant. The people of Jerusalem cut branches native to their area... we can do the same in these unusual times.

2. CONFESSION TIMES are in the Bulletin. There is a Second Rite of Reconciliation at Blackheath on Tuesday evening. First Rite Confessions in the Upper Blue Mountains Parish are as normal, with the addition of Confession after weekday masses on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of Holy Week.

Please Note: although there will be Confessions after the Way of the Cross on Good Friday at Katoomba, this is by way of EXCEPTION. The Church encourages EVERYONE to make their Confession before the Easter Triduum commences - that is, before the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday evening. This is so that we are all prepared for these important days beforehand; and the Church wishes the Church's Ministers (the priests) to have the time and space to pray and reflect during this most holy of days.
